
Earth Month!

The first Earth Day was held in 1970 celebrating the birth of the modern environmental movement. While Earth Day 2006 was April 22nd, we believe every day is Earth Day and feel it is important to highlight how individual efforts can make a real difference. Here are some cool facts about how recycling helps conserve energy.

• Recycling one aluminum can saves enough energy to run your television for three hours.

• Glass recycling saves 25-30% of the energy used to make glass from raw materials.

• Each year in Massachusetts, energy savings from recycling equate to 66 million gallons of gasoline or a years worth of gas for 70,000 automobiles.

<u>Wondering what you can do with your classroom for</u> <u>Earth Month?</u>

Have a Waste Free Lunch Day/Week: Hold a contest to see which classroom makes the least amount of litter during lunch time for a day or a whole week.

Organize a schoolyard or neighborhood clean-up: Pick up garbage from your school yard or favorite neighborhood spots. Educate your school and community on how litter affects everyone.

Create Earth Month signs or posters: Have students create posters or signs for the community recycling center, library, Town Hall, or school to remind other students, family members, and neighbors why and how to recycle, reduce, reuse, and compost.

Plant native trees and flowers: Spruce up your schoolyard or local park to keep the planet healthy.
