Wednesday, June 12 – Application deadline for MassDEP <u>Sustainable Materials Recovery Program (SMRP) Municipal Grants</u>, which offer funding to cities, towns and regional entities - as well as certain non-profit organizations that provide services to them - for recycling, composting, reuse and source reduction activities that will increase diversion of municipal solid waste and household hazardous waste from disposal. Grants are available for recycling and composting equipment; Pay-As-You-Throw programs; waste reduction enforcement; school recycling; and local/regional waste reduction projects.

June 23 – 29 – Applications from rising 9-12th grade students are being accepted for the Green Schools Alliance Student Climate and Conservation Congress (SC3), to be held at the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service's National Conservation Training Center in Shepherdstown, WV. The mission of the Student Climate & Conservation Congress (Sc3) is to empower outstanding student environmental leaders with the skills, knowledge, and tools necessary to address natural resource conservation challenges and better serve their schools and communities.
